Restaurateurs and chefs in downtown Toronto understand this, and from mid-morning to mid-afternoon on any given weekend, they are

pleased to offer their customers a break from the work-week's three-meal routine and offer a chance to relax around the table with friends, significant others, or just a newspaper and some well earned time to oneself. In a city as diverse as Toronto, it follows that brunch options are as varied as the people in it. Here are just a few favourites from the downtown West End.



LE SÉLECT BISTRO

Since 1977, Le Sélect has earned its way into the hearts of the Queen West crowd. Chef Albert Ponzo offers classic French bistro fare and gallicized classics by serving his eggs benedict on a croissant and stuffing his French toast with apples.



Q. In a word, or a phrase, what does Queen West mean to you?

A. In a phrase, a textured mix of old and new.
Q. Along with Tridel, you've been an integral part of the revitalization of Alexandra Park; tell us what Teeple's vision is for the area?
A. It simply has to be amazing. That's the goal. Our aspiration is to create communities that will become a must-see for both Torontonians and out-of-towners. We want to design buildings and public spaces that will add dimension and character, extraordinary structures that endure.

Q. How important has environmentally conscious design been to the first two stages of the revitalization of Alexandra Park? A. Both projects we are working on in Alexandra Park are LEED Gold, and that's not an easy task. LEED stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design, a rating system that is internationally recognized as the mark of excellence for green buildings in over 150 countries. What does this mean? It means everything we do, from design and construction to operations and maintenance, is executed sustainably. We also need to ensure that residents can live a sustainable and green lifestyle. That means integrating walkability within the neighbourhood, ensuring close transit options and developing new green spaces.

Q. Lastly, where do you see Alexandra Park in fifteen years?

A. I see Alexandra Park as a fully integrated urban community. Part of the city that everyone can enjoy equally and wholly experience.

215 Spadina Ave.







Toronto's burger miracle started in a tiny east-end storefront, but now the downtown crowd can also share in the glories of Daniel (Harry Potter) Radcliffe's favourite TO eatery. Owner Shant Mardirosian parts the waters of the current gourmet burger deluge with an honest beef patty in variations like "Magnum" (blue cheese and bacon). Don't overlook "The Option", a deep-fried Portobello mushroom burger for the veggie crowd.

Delicious sandwiches are also on offer. Find a seat in one of two rooms, or watch the world go by from the front porch.

The Beast's commitment to using Ontario sourced ingredients means their menu changes weekly, based on what's in season. Constant is the way in which they expertly use those ingredients to create a memorable meal. Sharing is encouraged, expanding the taste experience. Even the sauces used to decorate the plates are special. The artisanal cheese plate is a great way to start. Weekend brunch is popular, no doubt thanks to the homemade doughnuts.

BUCA

Hidden down a dimly lit cobbled alleyway between historic buildings, part of Buca's charm lies in finding it. This Italian restaurant offers an extensive wine list and a wonderful selection of cocktails. Choose from a menu filled with interesting appetizers, pastas and main courses, or allow them to surprise you with the tasting menu. A highlight is the thin crust pizza, charmingly presented with a pair of scissors for self service.

CULTIVATING COMMUNITIES

HOW BOWERY PROJECT IS PLANTING THE SEEDS OF PROSPERITY IN ALEXANDRA PARK.



Bringing urban agriculture to the inner city, Bowery Project believes that vacant spaces should be revived, enriched and productive. Land is used to grow food and give back to the community. When the Bowery founders became aware of vacant land behind the new YMCA of Greater Toronto, they contacted the YMCA Youth Shelter. It was during their initial conversations that they realized they both shared in a common mission: to increase access to urban agriculture in downtown Toronto.

Supported by an Ontario Trillium grant and Partnering with the YMCA, Toronto Community Housing Corporation (TCHC) and Tridel, the not-for-profit organization is setting up a 1,500 milk-crate farm, growing vegetables on 750 sq. ft. of 'vacant land' inside Alexandra Park.


As Bowery's largest farm to date, the space will revitalize the area in a number of ways. Not only will the project transform the once-vacant lot into a growing space, it will also help educate the community on the importance of environmental sustainability, urban agriculture and the farm-to-table movement. The most important detail? Enriching the lives of Toronto's youth who call the YMCA in Alexandra Park home. Through fun, creative and educational programming, the youth will be provided with skills that go beyond the classroom, allowing Bowery Project to cultivate more than just land, but also communities and the people who call them home.




GET TO KNOW BOWERY PROJECT


